

Bachelor of Oral Health (Therapy & Hygiene)

Charles Sturt offers the Bachelor of Oral Health (Therapy & Hygiene) at the Wagga Wagga Campus, or you can study the first two years of your course at the Holmesglen Institute's Chadstone campus in Melbourne.

If you are enrolled at the Holmesglen Institute, you will undertake lectures and pre-clinical training in Years 1 and 2 at Holmesglen, with some clinical training at Wagga Wagga.

Towards the end of your degree, you may be able to apply to embark on a short study tour to Cambodia.

The course qualifies you to work as an oral health therapist in Australia.

As a graduate, you will help combat the national chronic shortage of oral health professionals, while also making a valuable contribution to the health of your local community.

Oral health practitioners are skilled clinicians who examine and treat diseases of periodontal tissues and teeth.

They perform routine restorative and periodontal care with a primary focus on early diagnosis and treatment.

Charles Sturt's oral health and dental science graduates have excellent overall employment rates 94% of our graduates find jobs within four months of graduating.

Clinical experience

You will develop your practical skills in the state-of-the-art simulation clinic, dental technology/clinical support laboratory, biodental science learning suite and anatomy teaching facilities.

Bachelor of Oral Health Science

This two-and-a-half-year degree gives you an overview of rural health sciences before focusing on oral health and promotion.

You'll learn how to assist in the prevention and treatment of tooth decay and gum disease and promote oral health to rural Victorians.

In the first and second years of your degree, you'll focus on applied science subjects such as human biosciences, principles of public health and determinants of health.

You'll have access to our on-campus clinical facility to practise your skills in dentistry, oral health practice, special

needs dentistry and pharmacology before entering into external clinical placements.

Before starting your last semester, you must complete a summer semester that includes a two-week placement at either a rural Victorian dentistry practice or overseas, before returning to our Bendigo Campus to finish your studies.

The skills you gain in this degree are in high demand in rural and remote settings around Victoria - in community centres, Indigenous health collectives and dental clinics.

You may find work as a dental hygienist, dental therapist or oral health therapist.

Clinical Experience

Clinical placements form an important part of our program and take place primarily in Bendigo at our new 20-chair clinical facility at the Anne Caudle campus.

Bachelor of Oral Health

The Bachelor of Oral Health has a curriculum reflecting the latest developments in oral health for the education of oral health therapists (dental hygienists and therapists).

As a Bachelor of Oral Health student, you'll develop all the scientific, theoretical and clinical skills required for practice as an oral health therapist (which includes both dental hygienist and dental therapist practice).

Please note that the Bachelor of Oral Health is NOT a pathway to the Doctor of Dental Surgery. The Bachelor of Oral Health has combined vocational outcomes in hygiene and therapy.

Dental hygienists

Provide dental care for all age groups. They examine and record the nature and severity of periodontal conditions, and clean, scale and root-plane teeth.

Dental therapists

Provide dental care for children and adolescents. They examine oral and dental conditions, restore and conserve permanent and deciduous teeth, perform extractions of deciduous teeth, and remove calculus.

Under recent changes dental therapists are also able to provide care to adults under certain circumstances.

Clinical experience

In the first two years you'll undertake clinical work at the Royal Dental Hospital. In the final year, clinical rotations are undertaken at community clinics in metropolitan and rural locations.


The Dental School provides the most hightech dental teaching facilities in the southern hemisphere and teachers who are leaders in their fields.

Bachelor of Dental Science (Honours)

Launch your career in dentistry with this five-year industry Honours course. While undertaking La Trobe's Bachelor of Dental Science (Honours) you'll learn about oral health in rural and ageing populations and develop hands-on skills in clinical placements across regional Victoria.

You'll treat patients under the supervision of experienced clinicians and participate in community-based oral health promotion programs. You can also complete a community-based project or research project, which can lead to PhD entry.

You'll learn

Preclinical oral health: Develop knowledge in restorative, preventive and periodontal procedures. On completion, you'll be competent in preclinical skills including dental materials, infection control, OH&S, instrumentation and dental procedures.

Medicine for dentistry: Learn to take a comprehensive medical history and understand its role in safe dental health care. The implications of therapeutic drugs used in managing medical conditions will also be covered.

Clinical practice: Discover how to apply diagnosis, treatment planning and technical skills to the management of patients in a clinical setting.

Prosthodontics: Learn the principles of fixed prosthodontics through lectures, tutorials and laboratory sessions and apply them in practice during your clinical placement.

The University offers an accredited dentistry qualification at the graduate level. The following is a suggested study pathway at The University.

Undergraduate

Complete the Bachelor of Science or the Bachelor of Biomedicine (3-years)

Graduate

Complete the Doctor of Dental Surgery (4-years).

Undergraduate

First you will complete the Bachelor of Science or the Bachelor of Biomedicine.

Doctor of Dental Surgery

Next you will complete the Doctor of Dental Surgery, which will provide you with the minimal qualification and competencies required to register for practice as a registered dentist according to the Dental Practice Board.

As part of the four-year full-time degree, students spend significant time in provision of patient care, and clinical methods, as well as undertake a two-year research project in oral health.

In the final year, students have the unique opportunity to experience working in a private practice setting, where they will learn how to run a small dental clinic.

Guaranteed entry

Applicants can secure guaranteed entry into the Doctor of Dental Surgery via acceptance into one of the following programs:

Graduate Degree Package – Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Biomedicine / Doctor of Dental Surgery.
